

What should I do if I see someone else is being bullied?

- Don't walk away and ignore the bullying.
- Let the bully know what is happening.
- Tell the bully to stop if it is safe to do so.
- Don't stay silent – tell someone or the bullying will keep happening.

DON'T:

- Do what they say.
- Get angry.
- Show you are upset.
- Hit them.
- Think it's your fault.

If you are bullied: DO:

- Ask them to STOP if you can.
- Use eye contact and tell them to go away.
- Ignore them.
- Walk away and find different friends to play with.
- Find an adult to tell or talk

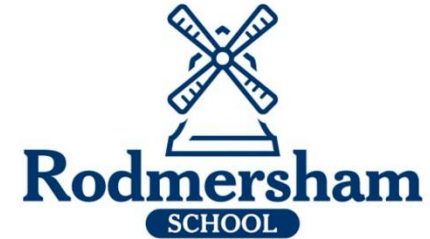

What is Bullying?

In our school a bully is someone who hurts someone more than once, by using behaviour which is meant to hurt, frighten or upset another person. Bullying can be by one person or a group of people.

Physical Bullying	Hitting Smacking Kicking Punching Physical contact that is harmful
Verbal Bullying	Name calling Threats Offensive remarks Insulting someone because of their religion, skin colour and background
Indirect Bullying	Spreading nasty stories Gossiping and leaving others out of social groups Stopping someone from having a nice time at school
Cyber Bullying	Sending nasty emails Sending nasty texts Making nasty phone calls
Sexual Bullying	Unwanted physical contact Inappropriate touching Sexual name calling
